Director of Life Saving

Andrew Edmunds

2017/18 has been an excellent year for Life Saving services within the Far South Coast Branch. All clubs worked together, with patrol members volunteering at other beaches to back each other up during emergencies.



FSC clubs continued with patrols in the branch from September through to April. Notably all Eurobodalla and Bega clubs provided 9am to 5pm patrol services over Saturday, Sunday and Public Holidays – with an increase of 8 hour patrols in the February period at Batemans Bay and Broulee. Moruya Surf Life Saving Club patrolled a second beach (Shelley Beach) over January and Easter period.

Proactive patrolling has seen a dramatic reduction in rescues, callouts and most importantly coastal drownings. A focus on preventative actions saw a 27% decrease in rescues this season.

The FSC Branch has again been a leading partner in the Surf Life Saving NSW Emergency Response System, responding to 36 incidents from July 2017 to June 2018. All calls were out of hours or away from regular patrolled locations and most were tasked through 13 SURF.

Volunteers responded to incidents day and night covering over 200 kilometres of coastline. On a single day lifesavers responded to incidents from Bawley Point down to Eden. Sadly, we had three fatalities this season in our Branch, however none were at patrolled locations.

Remarkably, club callout crews responded from home or work, to the scene with rescue equipment, recording an average response time of 11.5 minutes. On average their response time improved by two minutes which is remarkable given the time critical nature of drowning. On many occasions, surf life savers were the first agency on scene providing vital rescue and first aid services.

Support operations continued to work well at Broulee and Pambula with RWC patrols and callouts. Bermagui SLSC started running RWC training in the central area, and the branch acquired second hand skis from Central Coast Branch and Illawarra Branch. A big thank you to Don Hay, Darren Browning, Cheryl McCarthy, Kiaran Harris for their efforts running these skis.

Surf Life Savers continued to work in very well with the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service based at Moruya airport. The FSC Branch conducted numerous

training exercises with the aircraft, and had operational debriefs after major incidents to improve combined responses.

Moruya SLSC, Broulee Surfers SLSC, Batemans Bay SLSC won the State and National Rescue of the Month in March 2018.



Moruya SLSC won the Club of the Year, Dave Pheeney Patrol Efficiency Award for 2018. Moruya SLSC is recognised for their significant efforts throughout the season to keep the beach going population safe. Moruya are to be commended for their efforts patrolling not one beach, but two over the peak summer and Easter holiday periods, with the club continuing to patrol

Shelley Beach Moruya as well as Main Beach via roving and traditional patrols. The club did not record a single breach of lifesaving standards throughout the season. The club performed almost 2000 patrol hours this summer, recorded 1 rescue at the main beach, 4 first aids, 190 preventions and looked after 2000 swimming/beach patrons over the summer. The Moruya patrol swung into action at the finish line of the George Bass Marathon when Pambula member Wayne Kent collapsed with a suspected cardiac attack. CPR including defibrillation was performed by the patrol (including a number of SRC members), Pambula boaties, and other participants from Mollymook and Grange SLSC, with lifesaving outcomes. They successfully revived Super and he was later flown to hospital for further treatment. In March, members of the Moruya SLSC responded along with members from Broulee and Batemans Bay and a civilian fishing vessel to a boating tragedy off Moruya Heads in very large and dangerous surf conditions. As a team they rescued five persons and bravely conducted CPR on a 13 yo female to no avail.

A big thank you to our Branch duty officers Anthony Bellette, Ken Bellette, Don Hay, Andrew Holt, Bruce McAslan, Harley Dengate, Ben Bate and Andrew Mizzi for their efforts over the year. I'd like to make special mention of Cheryl McCarthy, Assistant Director of Life Saving who for the majority of the season manned our callout phone and managed over 30 incidents.

In March the town of Tathra was stuck by bushfire. The Far South Coast Branch played a considerable role in the emergency response and recovery operations that are ongoing. As fire broke out in the bushland surrounding Tathra, Far South Coast NSW, local surf lifesaving clubs immediately recognised the potential need for emergency support, both on land and water. 13SURF was contacted for SLS Support with 50 persons located behind the golf club near the river or on the beach without transport. Tathra SLSC did beach patrols advising patrons to evacuate the area immediately. Utilisation of FSC assets throughout the emergency included Tathra and Pambula IRB's patrolling the lower reaches of the Bega River for potential evacuees and remaining on immediate standby for potential rescues and evacuations. Communication with Tathra SLSC was very poor due to failed mobile coverage. Bermagui SLSC was used as an impromptu

Evacuation Centre, managed by surf lifesavers and housing up to 320 evacuees at its peak. Tathra SLSC was used as a recovery centre for the emergency. FSC Branch provided Duty Officers at Tathra, Bermagui, the Bega Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) and State Duty Officer communicating between all three ensuring hourly SITREPs were sent. The Bermagui SLSC emergency call out team was notified by Surfcom at 1632 of a request from NSW Police (via Sergeant Brendan O'Mahony of Narooma Police) to open the surf club as an evacuation centre (EC). South and West access and evacuation routes for the town of Tathra had been cut off and evacuees were leaving via the Tathra-Bermagui Road to the North. Club President, Bruce McAslan, and Secretary, Cheryl McCarthy, responded to the surf club and opened the facility. By 1645 the first evacuees started arriving. Bermagui SLSC is not an official evacuation centre location as identified in emergency plans of our local government area, Bega Valley Shire Council (BVSC), and members were not trained in evacuation operations nor did they have access to documentation or paperwork to assist. A process was created on the fly in consultation with Sergeant Brendan O'Mahony as evacuees arrived. Bruce and Cheryl were assisted in the immediate response by the following members of the Bermagui SLSC Leadership Team and Patrol Captains: Andrew Curven (Club Captain), Rachel Wallbank (Registrar), Neil Rutherford (Functions Manager), Steve O'Sullivan (Club Vice Captain), Shelley Davis (Nippers Coordinator) Rowan Blake and Euan McKenzie. By the end of the evening 320 evacuees were registered at the Bermagui SLSC EC and private accommodation for 326 people was sourced along with additional offers of hotel accommodation so all evacuees requiring a place to sleep were catered for. Approximately 18 – 20 evacuees chose to camp at the clubhouse on bedding supplied through donations. Surf club volunteers worked together with NSW Police, NSW Ambulance and members of the local community to provide a professional and timely response to the emergency. In the heat of the emergency the whole town was evacuated. 69 homes were destroyed, 30 cabins or caravans destroyed and another 30 dwellings damaged.

Tathra Surf Life Saving Club continues to be used as a Recovery Centre for the Tathra Bushfire relief effort. The surf club housed staff from the Department of Justice and worked as an outreach centre. The SLSC has transformed into a sudo supermarket with emergency stores and suppliers being coordinated by SLS volunteers in support of the broader community.

In 2018/19 I am looking to step down from the Director of Lifesaving role to take on some new challenges. I still be involved as a Branch Duty Officer and assist the new Director wherever possible. I'd like to thank everyone whom I've had the pleasure of working with over the last 11 and a bit years in the Lifesaving portfolio. Our branch has come along leaps and bounds from the humble days of no radio contact at clubs through to today where we have agile and capable callout teams leading the way across the state for emergency response. My mentor Mark McLeay, and presidents Dave Pheeney, Bruce Frost and Tony Rettke have been wonderful leaders to work with. Our lifesavers are among the best in the country, with numerous accolades and recognition. You all should be incredibly proud of what we continue to achieve and pull off. Our motto Vigilance and Service is spot on, the work every single person who wears the red and yellow is proof of our commitment to public safety.

Wambiri 2018

The move to Pambula Beach proved to be a rip roaring success at the 2018 Far South Coast Wambiri Leadership Camp with twenty seven Candidates and ten Mentors attending. This year, for the first time in 22 years, the camp was removed from it's traditional home in Tathra, to the Pambula Surf Life Saving Club. We voted to retain the name "Wambiri", which is an indigenous word for "Seacoast", which we thought most appropriate for our cause.

The move to PSLSC initiated a completely different accommodation format, one that proved to be a masterstroke regarding participant integration. The group rooms format was replaced by, what might be termed, an open plan design. The girls and female adults were accommodated in the first floor auditorium where all of the in house events were to be held, and the boys and male adults were housed in the ground floor gymnasium area. All attendees came armed with bedrolls for this eventuality. This year only our Under 14 Candidates, Leader Mentors from the previous year, and adult Helpers and Facilitators attended.



We found that with the groups being housed "en masse" that no small insular groups were formed and the candidates tended to move more as a united group. As in previous years, our candidates from the various clubs throughout the Far South Coast Branch and this year, four invited Candidates from Mallacoota, in

northern Victoria, were integrated into "Patrols" with each "Patrol" given beach patrol scenarios to review during the weekend and to put into practise at the end of the camp. Leader Mentors were also appointed to assist with the scenarios.

The weekend activities are now pretty much ingrained into the Wambiri Leadreship format, one which we find very successful. Dinner, following arrival, was the obligatory BBQ then all were assembled in the auditorium were welcomed by the Branch facilitators who explained the workings of the weekend. A number of introductory games were conducted, all attendees were given their camp number, then the candidates were placed in their Patrols and given their scenarios and appointed Mentors. Free time and into bed by 11:00 pm. All slept well, a vast improvement on past experiences.

Saturday morning up at 7;30 am to a hearty breakfast, then free time at the beach. 9:30 am saw the arrival of the Same Wave (formally Special Nippers) contingent for their hour or so of respite care. Our candidates assisted in this worthy cause for the next hour or so, and it must be said that they all enjoyed the experience and appreciated the work and devotion that goes into this programme. There are now three SLS Clubs in the FSC

Branch that conduct this programme so many of our candidates were familiar with this cause. Lunch, and then the task of transferring nearly fifty people from Pambula Beach to Merimbula's Magic Mountain for the Tree Climb Challenge. This we did with the use of the use private transport which worked out very well. Tony Vella was awarded the trainer of the year, which reflects the amount of time and effort he puts into running his courses.



The 2017-2018 has been another successful season and one that we can all be proud to have played a role in achieving the club's goals. Broulee Beach has been fatality free which is a great result considering visitor numbers were significantly up on last year. A surf club is an emergency service first responder but is also a surf sports club, a social club and also an organisation that fosters and develops the skills of young members. An outline of the club's activities follows.



Patrols

I thank all patrolling members who have given freely of their time and taken on the responsibility of looking after others on our beach. There were 184 patrolling members who have completed 5,377 patrol hours for the season. 166 preventions, 48 rescues and 21 first aid responses were performed and this shows the importance of the work we do. The records show that 26,878 people visited our beach during patrol hours this year. This is over 6,000 more

than last year.

In addition to scheduled patrols, some members have responded to emergency call outs. One recent example was a boating accident at the Moruya River Mouth where members of Moruya, Batemans Bay and Broulee clubs attended.

Membership

We are a big club. We have 653 members in total which includes 246 nippers, 211 associates and 184 patrolling members. Within this number is included 123 Canberra based nippers and their families. The proportion of our members who are based in Canberra continues to grow in number and significance within the club. Members all contribute in many different ways and the club thanks everyone for their efforts during the season.

Trainers and Assessors

The team of trainers and assessors have had a very busy season. There were 593 proficiencies done which included 286 nippers' swims. There were 371 new awards which included 208 nipper awards. Special thanks to Kel Pearce, Mick Lambert, Peter Halpin,

Craig Goddard, Nick Goddard and Gary Pettigrove.

Without the trainers carrying out the annual proficiencies and assessing members for new awards, we simply would not have people on the beach capable of patrolling.



Nippers

We are unique in that we have Nippers made up of two distinct groups. As well as our Broulee based Nippers, there is also a Canberra based group of approximately 120 nippers, plus parents and helpers. The two groups work well together and the contribution of this combined group is vital for the future of the Broulee Club. I thank all parents, water safety volunteers, age managers, carnival officials and all who have played a role in this group. Special mention must be made of Scott and Simone Elliott who coordinate the Broulee based group and Steve Corcoran with his committee who have coordinated the Canberra group. I also thank Bethany Williams for her vision and work in establishing the Canberra Broulee Nippers.

It is important to make special mention of Amanda Smith who after three years as water safety coordinator has retired from that role. Also Scott Elliott and Dave Hosking who have been age managers of their group for the past seven years. Your contributions have been huge and much appreciated.



Your generosity is greatly appreciated. I would also like to make mention of how proud I was to be in camp for the final few days and witness the culinary



wonders created by Ogre and Dave Paul. Your ability to feed the masses with little to no fuss is scary. Finally, to Gary and Rhonda, thank you is nowhere near enough recognition for your efforts. I can only hope that your return to Bass camp will continue so that your knowledge and experience can be passed on to future generations.

We were fortunate enough to host the Far South Coast Branch Awards night, allowing us to showcase the wonderful improvements that we have made to our Club. A massive

thank you to all members involved in making this night the great success that it was. As mentioned, we were awarded the Dave Pheeney Patrol Efficiency Award for Club of the Year. Once again the support provided by our management committee to myself and the direction and professionalism they have demonstrated this season through some very trying times has been outstanding. With this said, I would like to make special mention of the work undertaken by Vice President and Registrar Karyn Starmer. The work that you do is above and beyond and is very much appreciated.

During the 2017/18 season the club fell victim to a scam that had a significant impact on our finances. While the end result is far better than what it may have been the most noticeable aspect of the incident was the way that club members rallied to ensure that our economic viability wasn't compromised. As it should be, in times of adversity there is strength in numbers and we as a club are very strong.

Earlier this season I had the opportunity to bring a group of Under 20's Canberra Raiders players down for a pre-season camp, introducing them to our Surf Life Saving culture and the benefits of volunteering. Many of the boys had no idea that people selflessly dedicated their time for the benefit of the community. The competitive nature of all athletes, both big and small, was on display for all to see in the events contested and hopefully inspires Nippers to be the best they can at whatever they choose to do. It is very pleasing to see our hardy group honing their skills on a regular basis both at club days and through competing at local carnivals. I would also like to thank everyone involved in our Nipper Program for being part of creating a great culture for the current U/20's playing group who, at the time of writing my report, are placed in the top four clubs in the NSW Jersey Flegg U/20's competition. The Special Nippers Program highlights the dedication and care provided by our wonderful group of volunteers and leadership group. This program is outstanding in what they continue to achieve and the opportunities and experiences that they provide for their participants. To all our weekly helpers, be it for our Friday sippers, nipper water safety, special nippers carers, car parkers etc, your commitment to the club is very much appreciated. A special mention must go to

thank our outgoing Fun Run Committee for your efforts over the past six years. As stated elsewhere, the new committee has some large shoes to fill.

The support and friendship of **Dial Before You Dig (DBYD)** has continued and we are extremely grateful for their extremely generous contribution. Thank you to Chris Holley and Dominic Puiu from DBYD for their assistance and representations on our behalf to the DBYD board.

In my report last year I questioned how many of our current membership base would feel comfortable entering the water when the proverbial hits the fan. While sound beach management by our Patrol Captains keeps critical incidents on our home beach to a minimum, it is the uncontrollable incidents that highlight the skill and dedication of our call out teams. Two significant events resulted in club members from Moruya and surrounding clubs demonstrating how highly trained and committed we are as volunteers.



It is always harder when the realization hits that it is one of your own that is involved, and not a truer word could be spoken. Comments made by police and emergency personnel with regard to how dedicated, skilled and professional all members of the surf lifesaving movement were in response to an incident at Tuross is something that we, as an organisation, should all be very proud of. To everyone that assisted in the search for our beautiful Liz Hallahan, your dedication to selflessly serve friends, family and our community is greatly appreciated.

The second major incident occurred in March of this year and occurred in the Moruya River Mouth. Moruya members Shuan Pike and Michael Weyman, assisted by members from Batemans Bay and Broulee Surf Clubs, successfully rescued 5 people from a capsized vessel. Tragically, a thirteen year old Canberra girl, Georgia Vizovitis, was unable to be revived. Members from the Georgia's family personally attended the club after the incident to thank those involved in the rescue. A very sobering reminder of why we do what we do.

As is the case each year we must reflect on those that we have lost and this year is no different. I pass on my deepest sympathies to all our members and friends that have been affected by the loss of a loved one throughout this season. I would like to take time to recognise four families that have not only been great supporters of surf lifesaving on the Far South Coast, but are wonderful family friends. I have spoken earlier about the tragic loss of Liz Hallahan. While there are so many things that could be said about Liz, perhaps the greatest comfort we can take from her loss is the joy and happiness that is ever present in the smiles and laughter of all participants of the Special Nippers Program. Our thoughts and prayers are with Kerry Parbery, who said farewell to her son Andrew way too soon and to Peter and the Connaughton family on the loss of Narelle. Finally, to the Pickett and Stroud-Watts families.

The recent funeral of Steve on the Gold Coast highlighted what a significant impact he had during his time with us. None more so than the eulogy given by a man that Steve resuscitated at Tallebudgera Surf Club during a boxercise class. It has been well documented that Pik and I shared some time together on a double ski during a George Bass Marathon but more importantly I was able to spend the best part of thirty odd years with a mate. Your flared nostrils and steely look of determination will be sorely missed



This year's report was by far the most difficult to write both as President of Moruya and a member of the Far South Coast Branch. This season has provided so much tragedy for so many people. Yet through all this adversity, the surf lifesaving movement has continued to look after their respective communities and without hesitation assisted other clubs in times of need. With the care demonstrated amongst clubs, it is hardly surprising that Far South Coast Branch received a nomination for Branch of the year, an accolade very well deserved.



As always, I close my report by thanking all our wonderful members for the time and effort supplied this season to ensure that our core business of keeping people safe has once again been upheld to the best of our abilities and by apologizing if I have missed personally thanking anyone in my report.


Patrols:

All the committee roles were filled this year and we've had impressive input from a number of other

A shining example of quiet, strong leadership. Neil Rutherford is our Functions Coordinator/ Licensee and has again done an excellent job of managing functions which are our main source of income for the club. He has worked tirelessly and we've had tremendous success as a result and the future is looking very bright on our functions side. Paul McCarthy took on the role of Radio Officer this year and has done a great job with updating our entire radio capabilities with 9 brand new radios plus an additional model dedicated to the marine channel. We had a new Treasurer this year, Maureen Croft, who has combined with the Associate Treasurer, Bronwyn Judge, to bring our finance systems up to speed and make sure that everything

is running professionally and smoothly. Club stalwart, Warren Marshall, continues to provide valuable input as IRB Captain and one of our trainers and Brian Logue has worked hard on keeping our boards and other equipment in good nick. Another major contribution has come from a member who constantly shows that you don't have to be part of a committee to make a significant contribution. Robert Johnson was awarded Bermagui SLSC Club Person of the Year. Along with his patrolling contributions, he has been a tireless volunteer in a number of other ways, lending his skills as a plumber and general handyman, looking after club maintenance, volunteering with Same Wave and still finding time to raise a significant amount of money through recycling since the container deposit scheme was introduced. Robert has been rounding up bottles and cans and turning them in for cash and he's raised over \$4,000 this past season ... that's over 40,000 bottles and cans!! Last but certainly not least is our driving force, Cheryl McCarthy. She has continued to bring an energy to our club that is amazing. Her attention to detail and keen business sense has driven the club to achieve new heights and standards. One of the results of her tireless work is our club being awarded Bronze Level in the SLSNSW Quality Clubs Program. Cheryl has monitored this carefully and ensured that all team members know and understand the requirements for this program so that they can roll them into their day to day activities within the club. Thank you all for your exemplary work!!



We have had close to 7,500 visitors to our beach this year and our team has done a great job keeping everyone safe. We had 5 rescues and two emergency call outs and we've had a strong focus on visitor engagement so that we can educate and preempt incidents as much as possible. This is shown in a 40% increase in the

number of preventative actions we've undertaken this year compared to last. We've also doubled our active patrol membership to 43 in the past two seasons, due mainly to our flexible self-select rostering system which is now being trialled by other clubs around the state.

Our leadership team encourages all of our members to be engaged. It doesn't matter if someone does not have a bronze medallion ... there is always something that our members can offer so we cultivate that thought and make direct, face to face asks of people with specific skill sets that are valuable to the club. We have adopted the mantra

"let's make the club a fun place to be" with the emphasis on a family environment. We are encouraged by the smiles we see on our beach and around our club. So many of our members are coming to the club with the "what can I do to help?" attitude. While we have an emphasis on having fun we will not lose focus on the need to do things safely and professionally. Our new Safety Officer, Maggi, has set up a schedule of "walk about" inspections of the facility and beach as well as raising awareness with our patrollers to be vigilant with regard to safety issues. Prevention is the key.

Junior Activities:

Another area of growth has been in our Nippers program, led by Rose Chapman, Christina Potts and Shelley Davis. They have done an amazing job this year and were supported by an increase in parental and grandparental involvement to support our cohort of 72 Nippers ... the largest contingent in many years!! We had 26 volunteers for water safety, plus a number of age managers and beach support volunteers. We also saw an increase in carnival participants with our largest ever number of competitors across the season with 35 youngsters participating in at least one



carnival this year and many of them participating in all 3. Out of this group we had 2 Branch Champions: Sam Glasson in the U/10 Male 1km Beach Run and Asher Theodorakis in the U/8 Male Sprint. A big shout out to all participants and their support crews! Thanks also go to Sean Hendry and Holly Abbey for bringing a Beach Masterclass to Bermagui to provide some coaching for the athletes and also give the parents and volunteers some handy tips to help out with training in the future. Fantastic job by all!!

Functions:

Our beautiful club house is starting to get a reputation as a wonderful place to hold a social function. Weddings and milestone birthday parties have been the primary events hosted in our functions room. With our spectacular ocean view and the observation platform an ideal setting for a wedding ceremony, demand is growing. Neil Rutherford has done an outstanding job promoting our facility and providing guests with top notch bar and catering services. Our goal is to host an average of one major function per month. We hosted 12 major functions in the past year and we have several already booked for the up-coming season so we are achieving our goal.

Community Engagement:

A key program in our community engagement is our *Same Wave* program for people with additional needs. *Same Wave* saw an increase from 5 participants last year to 13 this year and support volunteers from 12 to 34. It was a great year and lots of fun was had by all. The best part, as always, is looking at all the smiles. We were fortunate to acquire a water wheel chair which was very helpful in getting some of our kids down to the water. It has also been used to assist members of the public to be able to experience the sand

and waves. Just an amazing piece of equipment. Thanks go to the Mumbulla Foundation for the grant money awarded for us to purchase it along with 4 Special Needs Demon Boards and some life jackets.

The Sunken Anchor newsletter continues to be a popular way of sharing information with our members and the wider community and contributions are always welcome. We held Friday Night Sippers in December and January which was a great way to bring locals and visitors into the club to learn about what we do. Everyone is welcome and you don't need to be a member to attend. Sippers focuses on family and fun and is designed to promote the Surf Club as an open, welcoming and accessible place for everyone in the community as well as visitors to our town. We've also received a number of function bookings from Sippers attendees so it helps in a lot of ways.

We also continue to support other community groups by providing water safety for their fundraising and community initiatives. The past year saw us support the annual ReBoot in Bermagui ocean swims as well as the Bermagui Runners Triathlon group. We also had some fun with the CRABS Duck Race with brave contestants riding inflatable ducks down the river! Strong relationships have also been formed with other clubs such as the football club and the cricket club. These relationships provide opportunity to source joint funding for initiatives such as "Same Wave" which complements "Kickability", a similar program for the football club which runs in the winter (football season). The surf club was also fortunate to become the host of The Umbrellas of Bermagui fundraising program this year. Funds raised were split between the surf club and the



Bermagui Cricket Club. Our thanks to Dennis Olmstead who has run this program admirably for a number of years now. We appreciate him lending his enthusiasm and expertise.

Training:

2017-18 has been another impressive year for training. Part of the goal is to ensure that if members want to be engaged they will be given appropriate training to ensure that they are successful in whatever role they choose. We have focussed on providing the opportunity for people to upskill and growing our numbers in SRC, Bronze Medallion, Advanced Resuscitation and the Silver Medallion Beach Management. We've also had a focus on powercraft this year with a number of new IRB Crew, IRB Drivers and even RWC Operators added to the mix.

Our training team includes:

- Bruce McAslan, Bronze Medallion and new facilitator accreditation for Advanced Resuscitation.
- William Vaughan-Smith who completed his Training Officer Certificate for the Bronze Medallion
- Warren Marshall, IRB Crew and Driver
- Cheryl McCarthy, Bronze Medallion
- Andrew Curven, Vikki Marshall, Rachel Wallbank and Brian Logue who provided subject matter expertise

Thanks to all involved for another wonderful year of training, upskilling and independence. In the past, we have often relied on the engagement of Branch Trainers to help us out and we have taken more steps towards increasing our own capability whilst providing opportunity for others in the Branch to participate at a central base. Thank you to both Tony Vella and Peter Bootes for your continued guidance and advice.

Equipment

We have worked very hard on applying for grants over the last year. As previously mentioned we were successful in acquiring a significant grant from the Mumbulla



Foundation for Same Wave. Other grants provided for some very substantial acquisitions. We have had a plan to update all our equipment with a further planned depreciation of assets to continually retire and replace on predetermined time lines, ensuring that we allocate funds appropriately so that funding is in place for the new assets. We've taken big steps in the past 18 months towards accomplishing the first part of this plan with new acquisitions including:

- New IRB and motor
- New Can-Am Defender (thanks to BRP and SLSA)
- New Rescue Mannequin for power craft training
 - A full set of 9 brand new radios
- New 1st aid kit, O2 kit and defibrillator

Acknowledgements:

We have had significant contributions made to our effort this year by every level of the Surf Life Saving movement. We thank our members and volunteers for all the input they have given. At the Branch level, I'd like to thank our Branch President, Tony Rettke, for his leadership and sage advice. Guidance on so many levels from Sue Hunt must also be acknowledged. From a friendly smile and a hug to let us know she is "always there for us" to phone calls and e-mails providing advice to joining our club this year as an active patrol member. Andrew Edmunds and Wendy Law have also provided guidance and advice all along the way on the lifesaving and finance fronts.

One truly outstanding area of contribution that need to be mentioned was the way in which our club, and our whole community, responded to the Tathra Bushfire emergency. With no training or warning, our call out team responded to the surf club to open up as an evacuation centre. Before long, they were joined by not only other club members, but also by members of the community who heard what was happening and came by to lend a hand. By the end of the evening, we had checked in 320 evacuees at the surf club, providing food, medical support, accommodation and a friendly face in a time of stress. 
